


Introducing Godly Play



Children have an innate sense of the presence of God. The Godly Play approach helps them to explore their faith through story, to gain religious language, and to enhance their spiritual experience through wonder and play. Based on Montessori principles and developed using a spiral curriculum, the Godly Play method serves children through early, middle, late childhood and beyond.

As the summer comes to an end, a new school year begins. Endings and beginnings make up the circle of the church year and our lives. Starting in September we will have a new curriculum and a new approach to Sunday school. We are calling it “Children’s Church” using the Godly Play curriculum. Godly Play is more than a curriculum. It’s an invitation to play with the language of God and God’s people through sacred stories, parables, liturgical actions and silence.

Godly Play provides a prepared environment where learning occurs through discovery. Godly Play leaders approach children knowing that children have an innate sense of God and a child’s profound need is to be in contact with the wonder and love of God so the child can find their identity. Godly Play is a Montessori type environment with child-sized items that children can touch. Did you know that Maria Montessori had the first known children’s chapel as early as 1922? Montessori’s children’s chapel was a child-sized version of a larger church.

Classroom #1 in the education wing will be a dedicated children’s space where children will listen to Bible stories, learn about sacraments and liturgy and respond to what they have heard. Children’s Church will be held during the 10:15am service on the second, third and fourth Sundays. Parents are asked to bring their children to Classroom #1 at 10:10am, and the children will return to their families at the time of the Peace. On the first Sunday of the month, “Family Sunday” the entire family will worship together in the sanctuary and the children and youth will participate as Lay Ministers.

Godly Play requires materials to set up the space and tell the stories, and it requires adult dedication.
